2013 AIA National

Surveyed and interviewed 31,000 members and stakeholders



AIA National Repositioning Findings & Vision

Component autonomy vs. unity

 Aligning for results while preserving unique assets / identity

Lack of tier coordination

• Creating a more cohesive member experience by reducing duplication and redundancy

Confusion of structure

• Creating a clearer value proposition through more consistent service delivery



2013 AIA Nebraska Priority Survey

Top 3 Priorities

Result: The New AIA – 5 Initiatives

- NOMA Collaboration (Nat'l Org of Minority Architects)
 - Extending 3 year MOU
- Governance Change
 - Reduce AIA National Board size from 53 to 14
 - Creating Strategic Council: 40 to 50 members
- Examining Diversity
 - Increase demographic representation of AIA & students enrolled in BArch & MArch
- Digital Transformation
 - 2 yr. initiative increasing AIA value to members & professions
- Chapter Support (Including Accreditation)
 - 7 Core Member Services

Member Communications

- Promote value of AIA membership
- Promote AIA resources to members
- Support AIA brand



Education

- Collaborate statewide to ensure access to 18 credits per year of continuing education
- Ensure quality continuing education
- Offer IDP support, ARE preparation and other resources to emerging professionals in pursuit of licensure and career development
- Maintain member CES transcripts
- Offer any AIA member, regardless of assigned component, a reasonable opportunity to participate in component Continuing Education programming



Advocate

- Advance AIA legislative priorities
- Engage regulatory entities
- Empower members to advocate for themselves and their profession



Elevate Public Awareness

- Promote public awareness of the value of design and the role of architects
- Recognize members' design excellence
- Engage with local community



Governance

- Comply with federal and state laws
- Mitigate risk
- Keep local, state and national strategic plans up to date and aligned
- Develop visionary leaders to serve at local, state and national levels; participate in leadership conference



Membership

- Actively recruit and retain members
- Maintain member records in AIA database
- Engage members in fellowship/community



Finances & General Operations

- Conduct secure, transparent and timely financial practices
- Offer touch points (phone, website, email, etc.) to members and the public
- Participate in AIA volunteer and component staff and volunteer training opportunities




Definitions

- <u>Component</u>: this is the generic term used at AIA National to address every level of membership within the organization. AIA NE is a state component; AIA Omaha is a local component.
- <u>Chapter</u>: used locally instead of the word 'component', especially in reference to local components.
- Section: a local organizational unit within AIA that does not have a board or fiscal responsibilities. A section may be a subsection of a state or local component, which will have an elected board and fiscal authority over the section.



Model 1: AIA NE State Component & 3 Chapters



This model comprises a number of individual IRS 501(c)(6) organizations: not-for-profit chapters, each managed by an elected Board of Directors. In this model, a member pays dues to all three levels of the AIA (local, state and national).



Roles & Responsibilities of AIA Chapters

- May carry out any activities allowed by AIA Bylaws
- Must have bylaws approved by the Institute
- Up to \$1000 travel stipend for executive to attend CACE
- Must deliver Core Member Services
- Elects delegates to National Convention
- May charge dues
- Must elect officers and board
- Free leadership conference registration for exec & 2 leaders. Must attend once every 3 years
- Must provide member access to staff (may be through a partner chapter).



- Local Chapters will continue as is, but will have to become accredited with AIA National
- Local chapters will have the opportunity to enter a contractual arrangement with AIA NE or other administrative staff to meet Core Service requirements
- Local Chapters control individual financials, and all current chapter funds would remain




- State dues would remain the same
- National revenue share would go to AIA NE

Roles & Responsibilities of AIA Sections

- May carry out any activities allowed by AIA Bylaws.
- Need not have bylaws or get Institute approval.
- Executive (if any) need not attend; no travel stipend.
- Not required to deliver Core Member Services.
- May not elect delegates to National Convention.
- In question-May charge dues, but payment is voluntary.
- Not required to elect officers and board.
- Leadership and executive invited but not required to attend. Ineligible for free registration.
- Need not provide members with access to staff.



- AIA Nebraska would provide all core services
- All current chapters would become sections; maintaining their current local identity
- All current chapter funds could be held in separate accounts to be drawn upon by sections as needed
- AIA NE would partner with sections to create a budget inclusive of each sections' programs, and goals it would like to achieve

Model 2: AIANE State Component & 3 Sections



- Sections could continue to focus on local programming important to them (education, outreach programs, etc.)
- Sections can determine leadership roles, but would not have formal reporting requirements
- Sections would have representation on AIANE Board
- AIANE board size would change
- AIANE Bylaws would be revised



DUES

- One dues fee would be charged for all sections; in all probability, the dues would be an average of current chapter dues plus state dues
- Sections would not collect dues



Model 2: AIANE State Component & 3 Sections



the voluntary sections of the state.





- Lincoln and Western Chapters would become sections of AIA NE, and still maintain local identity
- AIA Omaha would remain a chapter
- AIA NE would provide core services to sections
- AIA Omaha Chapter would work as outlined in Option 1 (i.e., formal board, fiscal responsibility, provide core service and meet service requirements)
- AIA NE would charge chapter for providing core requirements if desired



- Section funds would be held in separate accounts to be drawn upon by sections if needed
- Sections would maintain a yearly budget within AIANE's budget and manage their own fund balance to operate their programs
- Sections can determine leadership roles
- AIANE Bylaws and Board Structure would be revised to include Board structure representation of sections and chapters



DUES

- One dues fee would be charged for all sections; in all probability, the dues would be an average of current chapter dues plus state dues
- Sections would not collect dues
- Chapters would continue to set local dues

AIA Nebraska's Status

- Received \$15,000 AIA National MSRTF Grant
- Held Core Member Services Discussion with Local Chapters
- Consulting with an Attorney



AIA National Deadlines

- Memorandum of Understanding
 - Nebraska Member Service Plan needs to be approved by the members and submitted to AIA National by January 31, 2016
- Chapter Accreditations due February 1, 2016
 - Nebraska components expect to successfully meet accreditation requirements in 2016
